

# **Principal's Report**

#### Dear College Community,

It was hoped that this year we would have a more typical year as the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic seemed to be winding down. Unfortunately, this was not the case. The massive flood that inundated Victoria and southern NSW in the last quarter of the year had significant effects on our ability to run typical college programs for most of Term 4, not to mention the devastating impact that the floods had on properties and livelihoods for some of our school families.

I am yet again extremely thankful for the opportunity to lead as Principal at Kerang Christian College and very grateful for the ongoing prayer support of the College community. We rely so much on the prayer support of many people, and we continue to be blessed to have quality, dedicated staff at the College who meet for prayer, for the reading of God's Word, and for praise and worship each school day.

I would also like to thank the leadership team of Business Manager Mr John Clarke, who was ably supported by Mrs Gayle Smith, Head of Secondary and VCE Coordinator Mrs Michelle Café, and Head of Primary Miss Bronwyne Van Leeuwen for their dedicated and committed work over the last year. Their efforts were indispensable in keeping the College running smoothly.

I would also like to particularly acknowledge and thank Mrs Leanne Pryor, our Office Manager and Personal Assistant to me as Principal, for her incredible and steadfast support and work throughout this year. I wish to extend my gratitude to our College Board for helping to set and maintain the strategic direction and policies of our College. Our Board members, led by Board Chair Mrs Pennie Gill, have yet again worked sacrificially whilst using their talents and skills in their service to our College. Finally, I would like to thank our teachers who have worked tirelessly to help our students in their learning and have walked alongside them to achieve their best both academically as well as emotionally and spiritually. Our incredible staff at the College rely on the guidance and sustenance of God's Holy Spirit to be effective teachers and positive role models for living authentic Christian lives. We do this because we want our students to see that having a personal relationship with Jesus and living a life to which God is calling them is a life of fulfillment and purpose.

In 2022, there were limited effects as a result of COVID-19 yet still significant. A couple of classes were closed for a short time due to high incidence of COVID-19 in the cohort, and a

number of staff had to isolate after contracting COVID-19. As we were severely limited in relief teacher availability to cover staff absences, this added a significant load onto leadership and other staff members.

### Flooding

In week 3 of Term 4, Kerang township was isolated due to heavy flooding, and an evacuation order was put into place for the town. Consequently, the College closed from 23rd October for two and a half weeks. A number of our students were isolated due to ongoing flooding and unable to reach the College for a much longer period of time. The ability of secondary schools in Kerang to run VCE Exams was rescinded temporarily because of the evacuation order in place. Many of our students were traumatized as a result of the flooding, the isolation from the town, and the ongoing danger to their families and homes. Some senior students were not able to complete all of their VCE exams, however, our students were resilient and determined to sit the exams wherever they could. Head of Secondary, Michelle Café did an amazing and exhausting job of finding VCAA exam locations for our students that could be attended if road access was open and not flooded. Our VCE students sat exams in Swan Hill, Cohuna, Boort, and Bendigo.

When the evacuation order was lifted from Kerang, we were able to facilitate the remaining VCE Exams at the College during the final week of the VCE exam schedule. Our College also hosted VCE examinations for Kerang Technical High School. Unfortunately, a few of our students were still isolated by flooding.

#### The changes to our program due to flooding in 2022:

- The closing of the College and reintroduction of remote learning for students.
- The Year 5/6 Canberra Camp was cancelled due to flooding and isolation.
- The Year 12 Valedictory Dinner at the Tudor Function and Reception Centre in Barham was cancelled.
  A modified version occurred after VCE exams had finished.
- Our College exam program for Year 7 11 was cancelled for Semester 2 2022.
- Some staff were cut off by flooding and could not attend the College to teach.
- The College Bush Dance and community event was cancelled.

### Accounting

Xero, our accounting system, which was implemented first in 2019 continues to make our accounting procedures more efficient and effective.

Community – We continued to be affected by COVID-19 restrictions, but some improvement occurred. Events such as the local book parade were able to proceed again and many of our camps and excursions were held.

### **Child Safety**

The College continues to priorities Child Safety. At the start of the year, staff were again required to renew their understanding of what it means to be a Child Safe School through passing an online training module. Staff also undertook training responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic. In addition, staff were trained in strategies to recognise and understand the diverse needs of students with disabilities. New Child Safe Standards came into operation in July 2022 with it now incorporating 11 standards. All staff have attended regular training on what the new standards are and how we implement them at the College. The board has also received training on this by our Child Safety Champion Miss Bronwyne Van Leeuwen.

### New Administration and Primary Building Government Grants

Due to our successful funding application for a new administration and student services building and refurbished primary building provided through the Victorian Block Grant Authority and State Government funding, we began construction for these facilities in later 2022 with our preferred builder, Brendon Steel Building. The Administration and Student Services building should be completed in Term 2 2023, and the renovations in the primary building should be finalised by the end of 2023.

### NCCD (Nationally Consistent Collection of Data)

The Government Census annually collects data about our students with disabilities so that it may better understand and financially support students who need help.

### Policies

In 2022, the College Board and staff were able to continue their cyclic review of many key policies.

### **SEQTA**

Our Learning Management System is a suite of software used by teachers, parents, and staff at Kerang Christian College to manage marks, timetables, and student data. This software was initially rolled out in 2018, and we continue to increase our staff, parent, and student access to online learning and engagement through it.

In 2022, we again used SEQTA MyEdOnline to deliver remote learning for our students from Year 3 upwards during the flooding. This streamlined our delivery of at home learning. We will continue to enhance this functionality and use of this software in 2023 and beyond.

#### **Student Achievement**

We continued to celebrate student achievement throughout the year, and after three years, we were finally able to run our Presentation Night to celebrate student effort and achievement.

#### Resilience

Our entire College community, students, parents and guardians, extended families, and staff continued to show tremendous resilience as we navigated through a "once-in-a-half century" flood event. Unfortunately, the social, emotional, and educational effects of the isolation and flooding on our students, teachers, and families is still being felt.

### **Staffing Changes**

- I tendered my resignation as Principal of Kerang Christian College to take effect from the end of 2022. I expressed a desire to remain at the College in 2023 in a part time teaching capacity, which the Board accepted.
- In November 2022, we appointed Mr Tim Vellacott as Business Manager.
- The College Board appointed Mr Lance Davidson as Principal and CEO for the College from 2023.
- Mrs Jenny Moore indicated she will return to the College in a part time capacity after extended leave for the 2023 school year.
- Miss Aleisha Pryor was appointed as Chaplain to commence in 2023.

My wife, Pam, and I came to Kerang in 2017 because I felt the Lord had called us here, and in my 6 years as Principal, we have felt His leading and guiding not only in our personal lives but for the College. It has been an honour and privilege to lead His school, and I look forward to continuing to be a part of the College community.

### **Background Information**

Kerang Christian College is a non-denominational, coeducational, Christian College that commenced in 1983. It was relocated to its current location of 98 Wyndham Street in 1995.

In 2010 the name of the school was changed from Kerang Christian Community School to Kerang Christian College, and the school board and school community committed to expand the college into a prep to year 12 school. The first Year 7 students commenced the following year.

During 2016, the College participated in an innovative video conference partnership with other Christian Schools in our region. This provided the College with greater flexibility to best meet the individual needs of each student undertaking the VCE.

The College aims to challenge each student to achieve their best, while providing students with an opportunity to study a broad range of subjects. The College curriculum, while developed to meet the requirements of the Australian Curriculum Framework and government requirements, provides students with a great opportunity to study subjects across a wide range of learning areas. The College has developed the school curriculum to place a significant emphasis on Literacy and Numeracy.

Primary School students enjoy studying a range of specialist classes including Health and Physical Education, ICT, LOTE (Auslan), Performing Arts and Visual Art.

Some of the elective subjects that have been offered to Students in the Secondary School include: Food on a Budget, Money 101, Micro Business, Band, Life Skills, Cycle Up, Event Management, Community Service, Wood Tech, and more! The College is pleased to be able to offer a broad range of VCE studies to our Senior School students. Students are studying a wide range of VCE subjects, including: Accounting, Biology, Business Management, Chemistry, Computing, English, Health and Human Development, Legal Studies, General Mathematics, Mathematical Methods, Physical Education, Physics, Psychology and Systems Engineering. VET Sport and Recreation was added in 2022.

Students are encouraged to participate in a wide variety of extra-curricular activities. Many of these activities have a community focus, but are also in place to make learning authentic. Students have an opportunity to participate in camps, excursions, sporting events, musicals, competitions, incursions, chapels, assemblies and much more.

Our beautiful school grounds include a mixture of original buildings and modern facilities such as our Visual Arts Wing, landscaped, eco-friendly gardens as well as specialist classrooms in the Secondary School. Our modern learning environments provide our students with a flexible learning space to learn in ways that best meet their needs.

In December 2019, the College received approval from the Commonwealth Government to commence construction on a new Design & Technology Centre as well as a canteen with an outdoor seating area. Construction commenced in 2020, with the new facilities ready for use in Term 3, 2021. The official opening was held at the end of the 2021 school year.

In 2021 the State Government Approved funding for an Administration Building Construction & Primary Building Refurbishment to commence in 2022. The administration building will be completed in the first half of 2023 followed by the commencement of work on the primary building

### **Student Progress and Achievements**

#### **Student Performance**

Kerang Christian College uses a variety of assessment strategies to guide curriculum and instruction. These include teacher observation, projects, presentations, formative and summative assessment and various standardised tests. The College also participates in the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN).

The combination of all this data is used to determine individual learning needs. Information on student progress is communicated on a regular basis and opportunities exist for external assessment results to be discussed with parents on an individual basis annually.

### My School

The My School website enables you to search the profiles of schools throughout Australia. My School is an Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) information service. ACARA is an independent authority with functions including the publishing of nationally comparable data on all Australian schools.

The performance of schools on NAPLAN tests is greatly affected by a range of student intake and school location characteristics. When comparing schools, it is important to compare like with like. The My School website allows and encourages comparisons with schools that are statistically similar in terms of a range of factors known to affect test performance. Parents may access the College's profile by going to www.myschool.edu.au.

#### NAPLAN Comparisons

NAPLAN test results are a point in time view of the literacy and numeracy skills of individual students. NAPLAN data is used with a wide variety of other data sources in order to develop an education program that best addresses the needs of each student.

A number of the year levels at Kerang Christian College are small. Using this data to compare Kerang Christian College with schools with larger cohorts raises some validity questions. A smaller than normal cohort means that the percentage results are effected significantly by the result of one student.

A change in the population of a cohort of students will radically affect any tracking of progress over time. It is important to keep this in mind particularly when tracking the results from Year 5 into Year 7 over a two-year period.

#### Standards

For NAPLAN results, a 'National Minimum Standard' is defined and located on the assessment scale for each year level. These standards represent increasingly challenging skills and require increasingly higher scores on the NAPLAN scale.

# National Assessment Program

The table below indicates the performance of Kerang Christian College students against the National Minimum Standards for Literacy and Numeracy. It also indicates the percentage of students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 who have reached or exceeded the National Minimum Standards. The school supports students who have not reached the National Minimum Standards. Students who are below the mean, but not below the Minimum Standards, also receive extra support.

## **Community Engagement**

Later in the year a limited Kerang Show returned where the College provided a promotional stall.

The College also took part in the WonderWhite Recycling Rewards program which saw our students collect five large boxes (the maximum allowed) of bread bags that would be recycled into playground equipment. While we did not win the major prize, the college received new sports equipment for its efforts.

My role also included supporting the Parents and Friends Club with its tasks in the College including operating the Mother's Day and Father's Day stalls.

However, the major success for me this year was the completion of our first Yearbook. It perfectly captured the year's events and has received very supportive feedback from both parents and students.

### **Parent Satisfaction Survey Results**

Parents who send their students to Kerang Christian College do so for many reasons.

A recent study indicated that the small size of the classes and the college itself is a major motivation. Pastoral care and Christian ethos were also listed by almost 50 per cent of families as a reason to why they chose Kerang Christian College. Some parents spoke of the college's ability to meet the needs of the individual child as well as providing a compassionate and welcoming environment.

Most parents were also positive about the academic support their child received from the college with 78 per cent responding "somewhat" to "very" satisfied.

The latest survey indicates that most parents at Kerang Christian College are positive about the school's behaviour management, though the largest response by far was "somewhat satisfied". While "very" to "somewhat" satisfied responses totalled almost three-quarters, nearly a quarter answered "somewhat dissatisfied".

However, parents feel content about the communication between the college and themselves with 93 per cent of families responding with "mostly" or "always" when considering whether they receive information in a clear and timely way. The survey indicated a mixed response amongst parents in regard to the homework load. Fifty-one per cent answered "Yes" and 49 per cent answered "No" when asked whether they were satisfied with the homework program. When this result was broken down further, it indicated that 70 per cent of the "Yes" answers were parents of secondary students. Meanwhile, 65 per cent of the "No" answers came from parents of primary students. Eighty-three percent of the parents who were not satisfied with the homework listed "too much" as the reason.

The look of our uniforms is mostly supported by parents with 74 percent providing a satisfied response. However, when the survey asked parents how satisfied they were with the comfort level of the uniform, there was a more mixed response. Only 20 per cent were "very satisfied", 27 per cent were "somewhat dissatisfied" and the highest response was 40 per cent of parents who responded "somewhat satisfied".

It is great to hear parents' thoughts on how the school is operating, several parents even thanked the school for the opportunity to share their thoughts. Allowing our parents to express their views helps to strengthen connections between the staff, students and families. It also helps the college to have a better understanding of what we do well and where we can improve, as we strive towards excellence in Christian education.

Teachers have completed a wide variety of professional learning and development activities with a focus on the Australian Curriculum, curriculum writing, use of standardised testing data, the integration of technology, classroom behaviour management, differentiation for students with disabilities, and the overall wellbeing of students. The staff at Kerang Christian College are committed to implementing the aims of the College and is a team of committed teachers.

All teachers are required to declare they have undertaken a defined quantity and scope of professional learning and development activities when applying for renewal of registration with the Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT). Teachers are required to undertake at least 20 hours of professional learning and development that is referenced to the Australian Professional Standards for Teachers (APST) each year.

Professional learning and development sessions at Kerang Christian College are organised by the Leadership Team in line with annual goals and priorities. Kerang Christian College is committed to providing staff with access to ongoing Professional Development consistent with the Australian Charter for the Professional Learning of Teachers and School Leaders.

Teaching staff regularly participated in staff meetings, curriculum meetings and individual professional learning and development.

In 2022 primary staff attended training sessions on Protocols for Koorie education in Victorian schools.

# **Student Wellbeing and Pastoral Care**

Student wellbeing programs are an important aspect of the schooling experience at Kerang Christian College and are complimentary to the Christian Studies program. The College values the unique needs of each student and aims to support students to develop spiritually, academically, socially and emotionally. We recognise the importance of students feeling safe and respected in our school community. Pastoral Care at Kerang Christian College aims to develop Christian values in our students and assist them in discovering their purpose in life. Some of the programs and initiatives currently being offered at the College are outlined below.

### **Home Group Teachers**

Every year level at the College has a Home Group Teacher. All staff are committed to the personal and spiritual wellbeing of their students. The Home Group teacher has a special concern for the student as an individual and encourages personal growth.

### **School Chapels**

Weekly Chapel services offer encouraging presentations designed to be relevant to students. All our students attend and are given the opportunity to participate. Students are encouraged to offer musical presentations, sing along with songs lead by staff and students, interact with presenters and celebrate student achievements. Normally, Kerang Christian College conducts the following Chapel services – Primary School and Secondary School. During 2022, primary students met together once a week, whilst secondary students met in their individual year levels.

### **Buddy Time**

Buddy time takes place each Friday afternoon for 44 minutes for students in the Primary School at Kerang Christian College. Students in the upper grades are paired with a student who is typically two or more years younger. During this time the students complete a variety of hands on activities together. This special time allows students to learn a variety of skills including leadership, responsibility, taking turns, listening, sharing and even teaching.

### Restorative Practices & Revision of Behaviour Management Policy

The College implements a Behaviour Management Policy, which has a focus on Restorative Practices. Restorative Practices assist teachers, students and parents to build, maintain and restore relationships. Restorative measures help students learn from their mistakes, grow in self-discipline, take responsibility for their actions, recognise the impact of their actions on others, and reconcile and resolve conflict with others. The College Leadership Team in consultation with staff revised the Behaviour Management Policy in 2018, taking Restorative Practice one step further in providing resources and tools for teachers to use in fostering restorative conversations. By creating a common language among primary and secondary students and staff, we have already seen a positive shift in establishing purpose in discipline and having restoration at the centre of our practice. The Behaviour Management Policy was further amended in 2021.

As the College expands, we are continuously reviewing our strategies to ensure our students' needs are being met. However, we also recognise that we are in partnership with our students and parents. We acknowledge our parents as the most important people in the life of their children.

### Scripture Memorisation

Throughout the year, the Primary students learn Scriptures from the Old and New Testament that help them to develop a greater understanding of how God wants us to live. Each month the Scripture is explored during Chapel and Devotion times. The memorisation and discussion encourages students to explore how to apply God's work to their lives.

### **Student Wellbeing and Pastoral Care Policies**

Kerang Christian College is a Christian school that comes under the authority of the Commonwealth and State Governments. In line with our duty before God, the parents who entrust us with their children and the authorities of the land, we promote and provide a supportive learning environment in which all students can expect to feel safe, supported and respected. We recognise the need for clear and transparent and explicit programs and policies to ensure students' physical, social, spiritual and emotional wellbeing.

The College Board have approved a wide range of strategies, policies, procedures and practices that are inclusive of the needs of all children, including students who are vulnerable due to age, family circumstances, abilities, or Indigenous, cultural or linguistic background.


### **Staff Induction**
